## What is the most important piece of advice you have been given?

We will all face obstacles in life, some more than others, but what is important is that you realize you can't change the current state of the world or other people's mindsets – what you can do is choose to do whatever it takes to overcome the obstacle, and not repeat unfair cycles.

## What is the most important message you want to send out to young women thinking about a career in the insurance industry?

Any time you are thinking about how to act in a work situation, whether it's asking for a raise/promotion, demanding respect when you feel you've been mistreated, putting forth an idea for new processes, etc., if you find yourself hesitant to do so, ask yourself – if I were a man, would I hesitate? If the answer is no, there may be some underlying bias you have internalized that makes you believe you cannot act accordingly due to your gender. Reflect on that and reframe how you answer yourself.
